#### **The Gathering Place**



In May of 1982, The Gathering Place opened its doors at 1448 E St in Lincoln, NE. Originally designed as a hospitality center, its mission, according to one of the original founders, was to establish a house that could be turned into a place "where anyone with special concern for the poor, elderly, lonely, homeless, hungry, differently abled, and disenfranchised would feel welcome." The Gathering Place founders envisioned the house as a place where people from all walks of life could be in

the fellowship of one another so as to fill a void in the spiritual community in Lincoln.

Within the doors of the cozy, brick home built in 1906, The Gathering Place offered its guests multiple ways to feel welcome and accepted: lunches were served Monday through Friday from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., coffee and dessert were served from 8:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. Thursday through Saturday, and classes, seminars, workshops, one-to-one counseling, spiritual direction, consciousness raising and self-help groups were offered to all who may benefit. But two years after its opening, the Gathering Place founders recognized the growing problem of hunger, homelessness, and social isolation among low-income people in Lincoln. To respond to this need, The Gathering Place transformed from a hospitality center into what it is currently – a soup kitchen.

Now in its 33rd year, The Gathering Place is a program of Community Action and serves nearly 30,000 meals annually to those who face hunger in Lincoln. Evening meals are served Monday through Friday from 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., and bread and fresh produce are distributed two nights a week. This important work is made possible through the hard work and dedication of over 1,700 volunteers annually, and contributions from the community. Westminster has had a team of Gathering Place volunteers for a number of years, as part of our outreach in the Lincoln community, serving on the

second Friday of the month. Each month the call goes out for a team of four to six people to arrive at 4:45 p.m. and serve the meal that has been prepared. Westminster member Michael Ryan is the Administrator and Chef at the soup kitchen. Faith Village is proud to announce the \$140 collected in our offering well was used toward purchasing a goat, as well as a flock of ducks! Heifer International has been Faith Village's choice of offering for a few years now. In the past, we have given water buffalo, goat, and pig.

In December Sonia Harford, parent volunteer, explained how children in other parts of the world do not go to the store for their milk, but most likely get their milk from a goat. Goat milk is the only milk known to over half the world's population. An average goat produces over 10x its body weight each year in milk. That is almost 1 ton of milk per year!





We raised enough money this Fall to also purchase a flock of ducks. Ducks are more popular in Asia than in the West. They are raised extensively in China for their eggs and down. Ducks are omnivores, eating a variety of food sources such as grass, aquatic plants, fish and worms, but they can also rid farms of pesky weeds and insects. For millions of children around the world, it is duck eggs that provide the

cornerstone of a healthy diet. They are also sold for income to pay for medicine and school fees.
