Administration & Planning Focus Groups —Final Report—November 2018

Westminster Presbyterian Church is in a time of change. We are facing some tough realities with the size of our congregation; a budget that is shrinking; large, complex and aging buildings and grounds; and grief over the loss of staff and members who were family to us. However, as Samuel Rutherford said, some graces grow best in winter and Westminster is full of hope, energy, and excitement as we move into our next phase. As a part of the transition, the Administration & Planning (A&P) committee planned, executed, and facilitated 16 focus groups with the congregation to hear thoughts and desires for the future and health of the church. Groups were held at the church, in members' homes, and at retirement facilities at varying times over a three-week period to allow for people to participate at a time convenient for them. Attendance at these focus groups sessions was just short of 150 participants. Our conversations were active and robust, often extending beyond the 90-minute time-frame planned. The history and longevity of the participants was impressive, with the average group having 300+ years of participation in the life of Westminster.

Conversations were focused on three central questions: 1) What do you see happening at Westminster now? 2) What needs to happen going forward? 3) What is missing? Though the discussions took on lives of their own, many central themes emerged.

Energy, Excitement, and Hope

Participants were very excited about the renewed energy that Pastor Val has brought to our congregation. There is a "buzz" in the Garden Room that many long-time members have been missing. We have seen many new and returning members. Sadness over members who have moved on to other congregations continues, but most are ready to move forward with hope in rebuilding the church they call home.

Many expressed that they were nervous when our music department went through a transition; however, it is almost universally agreed that John and Laura have both continued our reputation for excellence in music and have even added to it. The music program is one thing Westminster is known for and was mentioned over and over as a highlight in the experience of our members. The inclusive spirit, including several low-commitment ways to use musical talent to praise God, is seen as a great addition to the program.

There is a sense that although Westminster went through a time of volunteer burnout, all hands are now on deck and ready to serve going forward. Participants who have volunteered under multiple leadership teams indicated that they did not expect staff and called pastors to do it all, and to do so would be patently unfair. Instead, they asked to be empowered to make a difference using their gifts. They asked that staff and our next pastor be the kind who searches out unique gifts of the members and utilizes them.

Role of the Next Pastor

It's no secret that Pastor Val is receiving high marks from this congregation. Although most would love for her to stay, they acknowledged that there are some key personality traits and talents that we want our nominating committee to look for in our next call. It is new territory for Westminster to be moving forward with just one called pastor. The participants noted some key things we need this pastor to do that have often been the job of associate pastors. Although scholarly, relevant, challenging, and spirit-filled sermons remain a high priority, participants expressed a need for a warm and inviting person who personifies Jesus' love for us. We want someone to get to know us and to minister to us. We also recognize that because one pastor cannot be all things to all people at all times, we want someone who serves with humility, building collaboration and empowering staff and lay leaders to minister, to plan, to execute, and to try new things. We want someone filled with a strong faith and a firm Presbyterian theology.

Worship Diversity and Excellence

Over and over, Administration & Planning heard that we have many different needs within this congregation. What we require is to honor those needs without diluting what we currently do with excellence. We do traditional worship very well. We are known for it in the community and we should capitalize on this strength. Most members were thrilled with the changes that Pastor Val has implemented in our sanctuary service to make it much more family friendly and inclusive for children. In particular, they noted the children bringing in the communion elements and the children's sermons in which children are developing relationships with the pastor.

There are some who enjoy a more adult-centered and seamless worship, but the majority acknowledged that the future of the church requires the presence of young families and is a bit more chaotic as a result. We also do a nice, meaningful chapel service.

The relationships, acoustics, and weekly communion meet a different need for that segment of our congregation. There is a strong desire to continue with this type of service.

The Rising has struggled to gain a foothold. That said, many who say an alternative style of worship doesn't work for them find it important to continue with it in some form. A group who would like to worship in a more casual, alternative venue shared that The Rising fills an important need for them. They had a meeting specifically about The Rising and expressed that timing and venue have been the biggest struggles for them. There is a lot of looking backward on "what might have been," but for those who are passionate about the future success of this worship experience, there is a great deal of energy and willingness to pitch in to make it happen.

The Education Church

Christian Education for all ages is seen as a brand differentiator for Westminster. Adult education and Bible study are core components of many members' faith formation and growth. They believe continuing a strong program in this regard is paramount. There is strong support and praise for the hard-working adult education ministry and the volunteers who schedule diverse programs. It was mentioned that the variety of teachers from the community is a great strength of Westminster's. Many passionate adult learners would love to see a younger demographic in class but realize that a corresponding program for children at that same time would be necessary for its success. Some expressed need for a young adult group for education, Bible study, or both and are excited that there is an option for this age on Wednesday evenings outside of the church building. It is also clear that scheduling conflicts, such as the new member class and The Rising, can create issues for adult education.

The Education Church Continued

Children's education has long been a strength for this church but needs some re-evaluation. We have strong leadership currently and the involvement of Pastor Val with the children of the church is much appreciated. The curriculum and model in Faith Village needs attention. It is a struggle to find teachers when they must miss the worship service. The sheer number of volunteers needed to make the rotation model a success is out of proportion with the number of children involved on Sunday mornings. There is also some concern that the curriculum is not appropriate for the broad age-range. It requires some modification for the younger students and 4th - 5th graders are too mature for the lessons as presented. Parents of children this age or slightly older expressed that their children have often chosen to remain in worship rather than attend Sunday school.

Confirmation is a large source of conflict at this point. Most believe that while we have a solid program, two years is simply too long a commitment for families. This is particularly true for larger families who look at the commitment of six years or more. The 9:00 am time is also difficult as those families with younger children are making two or three trips to church on Sunday mornings for everyone to get to their classes. We are losing members to a shorter, more intensive confirmation program. Pastor Val has shared that there are several different curriculums available from the denomination that vary in length and intensity. Several groups are studying these issues and the congregation should look for changes in the next few months.

Infrastructure

Participants love our building and grounds. We have a beautiful building and it is a draw to those in the community, as well as our own congregation.



The updated lounge looks great and is much more functional for adult education. There are many areas in need of similar treatment. Participants are concerned about the sound system in the sanctuary. It is particularly difficult for those with any level of hearing loss to hear during the 10:30 am service. Our home-bound members are concerned about the quality of the worship service as it is presented on TV. Members also expressed concerns about the "temporary" feel of Cole Hall for The Rising. The age of the TV monitor, the instability of the wireless network, and distracting activity in the area during worship were all mentioned as things to consider going forward.

Personal Connections

When asked to list highlights of their experience at Westminster, all participants put relationships in their top few. Most have developed those relationships through a small group.

Listening to the participants, the definition of "small group" was very broad – from washing dishes with Green at Heart, to serving on a mission trip, to playing in the bell choir, to participating in dinner, book, or bridge clubs. It was those friendships and supportive relationships that mattered. Some of these groups existed for a short season and others have continued for a lifetime. Some mentioned the need to make known which groups are "open" for new members and how to include newcomers in such groups in a way that is inclusive.

A lot was made of how to make certain each of our members – new and old – became connected with others.

There was no consensus on whether things should be formal or informal but there was broad consensus on the need to belong.

Process and Transparency

The congregation was thrilled to be asked to participate in these focus groups and to be "in the know" about what is going on. There were many requests for more regular sessions like these for members to share their thoughts. Lay leaders want more training and more responsibility. They are also busy and want it to be very clear what the expectations are. They acknowledge that they need help from staff to get it right but are nearly universally willing to roll up their sleeves when things need to be done. What they ask for in return is communication, appreciation, and support to try new things. We have loved the recent transparency of the financial and attendance information noted in the bulletins each week. There is a great affinity for Presbyterian government and process. We want our Session to be truly empowered. We are looking for a collaborative spirit going forward.

WHAT DO WE NEED IN OUR NEXT PASTOR?

Membership Growth

There was a lot of mentioned of "the missing generation" of families who have left our church and our aging congregation.

Most everyone wants more young families. Part of that strategy needs to be a better connection with the Westminster Preschool. There are some exciting new connections happening now with Parent's Night Out and the Preschool Advisory Board, but work is still needed.

Sunday Schedule

The Session is aware that changes may need to be made to the existing schedule on Sundays and throughout the week to meet the needs of a smaller congregation, a smaller staff, and a changing culture. A task force has been formed to study this. It was strongly suggested that we have a clear plan about who we are and what we want to be, and not sacrifice that or water it down. This is a delicate balance and may result in a solution that looks very different from our current situation to which we are accustomed.

Looking Ahead

Change isn't easy, but change can be exciting. As this congregation looks to the future, there will be times when things that have served us well may go away. This will feel like a loss. There will be new things that may not serve us personally, but ultimately will serve God's church. We will see new ideas that bloom and new ideas that crash and burn. That is OK. But as Presbyterians, we know that our elders are called into service to prayerfully make decisions for the overall health and vibrancy of our congregation. There are truths about which people of good character and principles may disagree. This is healthy and not a bad thing when it is expressed in ways that do not disturb the peace, unity, and purity of the church. At no time is this more likely than in times of change.

The A&P committee thanks Pastor Val for the idea and framework to hear from the congregation through these focus groups. We also thank all those who offered honest thoughts, offered their homes, and offered refreshments as we listened to what you want in our current and future church. We ask that you pray for our church leaders that they may make decisions that represent the will of our congregation, and more importantly, God's will for the growth and continuation of this church that so many of us call home.

Session Notes

Westminster session in November confronted several challenges for our church as we prepare for the call of a new senior pastor. Among them is the maintenance of a vibrant ministry in the face of declining membership and financial support.

Before it can prepare a Mission Information Form, detailing the state of the church, session addressed the need to determine a more accurate count of membership. The church rolls have not been formally reviewed for several years.

To this end, session has voted to send letters to those individuals on our rolls for whom we have no record of attendance for the past two years. The message is simple: we miss you and please rejoin us soon for worship. In the same way, elders are encouraging active members to extend the same invitation to friends they have not seen at church recently.

An accompanying concern is finances. Elder Bill Walstad, moderator of the Finance Committee, notes that current income is well below budget, making it difficult to meet current commitments.

Looking to the immediate future, session also heard a report from a Sunday morning task force on potential adjustments to our current worship and education times. Primary discussion focused on the time of our contemporary worship, The Rising, and the difficulties faced by families with youth in a range of ages involving different programs. There was also discussion of a reduction in the length of confirmation classes, and potential move of some Sunday youth programs to Wednesday evening. The consensus of session was to delay any action on programming changes until the January session retreat.

Maintenance of our grounds, equipment and building remain another on-going challenge. Building and Grounds elder Jim White reported that roof repairs were imminent and that his committee is preparing a long-term maintenance program. Music and Worship elder Jim Kinkennon reported that an expensive refurbishment of the pipe organ console is becoming critical.
