

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Presbyterian Disaster Assistance & the floods of 2019 in Nebraska

Most of the world would have difficulty remembering exactly what they were doing on March 15, 2019. But for people living in Nebraska, the date will be forever etched in their mind as "the day all 'heck' broke loose and blizzards and floods washed away decades of memories and possessions and forever changed the landscape of parts of the Nebraska farmland." Those "in the know" tell us that every single Nebraskan will be (or has been) affected in some manner by the floods of 2019!

The floods were "old news" to most people outside Nebraska within a few days – too many other natural disasters and world changing/shaping events were happening. But, having been with "boots on the ground and running (driving) from Niobrara to Falls City, from Fremont to Lynch – and all points between – for the past three months, we assure you – the flood has NOT gone away – nor will it anytime soon!

Within a week of the flood, representatives from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance were in Homestead Presbytery, accessing initial damage and giving us Gary Haller (Westminster PC) and Sue Babovec (HR)

basic information needed to start connecting with the areas most in need. Wow, have we learned a lot!!! And there is still tons to learn. There are groups who focus on "rapid response" to needs of those hurting (food, shelter, water, clothing) and that first "muck and gut" of damaged property – people like The Red Cross, The Salvation Army, Team Rubicon and many other (often faith-based) groups who were in Fremont, North Bend, Schuyler, Niobrara, Nebraska City, Columbus and other places around the Presbytery within hours. Many of our Presbyterian Churches opened their doors to welcome displaced people or provide meals or serve as collection/interview sites.



As this was happening, Homestead Presbytery made an initial request for a \$7,500 grant for immediate needs. Part of that has been spent providing direct help to children; helping host seminars in Columbus, Nebraska City and Fremont PC's to connect help and assistance groups and FEMA; assisting as requested with Long Term Recovery Groups being formed; and replacing some damaged appliances in a manse. The remainder of that grant is being used to establish host sites in some of our congregations



within the directly flooded areas to provide housing, a place to cook and shower for work groups coming yet this summer to begin working under the direction of trained volunteer and construction coordinators.

Most of the "rapid response" teams have moved on to the next disaster (and there have been many!) but we in Homestead Presbytery continue to work with our brothers and sisters to find ways to help in the long term recovery. To that end, we have been attending many meetings and making connections to other faith based (and government) organizations. As our initial grant is used, we will be making grant requests for PDA for "brick and mortar" expenditures – and we have some funds that have been donated directly to Homestead Presbytery that we will also be honored to prayerfully distribute on your behalf.

Working the past three months with this, sometimes seemingly slow, process, we have come to appreciate the value of the Long Term Recovery Groups in each community and their use of case managers to clearly interview, track and determine need. Working in this manner with them assures that the most people are helped in the best ways! It took time to get to this point – and as we said, most of the world has forgotten the floods of Nebraska – but many are still working faithfully and tirelessly to provide for good recovery for flood victims.

We are also in the process of forming a Homestead Presbytery Disaster and Beyond Response Team. Thanks to all who have indicated an interest in helping us – you will be getting a letter in the near future telling of specific needs we have and that our initial meeting will be at Camp Calvin Crest at 1:30 on July 10th. If you didn't respond yet but are interested in this group, there is plenty of work for everyone – and not everyone has to do everything! So please email Gary (txhaller2@att.net) or Sue (chaplainsueb@hotmail.com) and we'll add you to the list.

In the meantime, please continue to remember all those affected by the flood and those seeking to help find a "new normal" for them.


ADULT EDUCATION FORUM

FAITH THROUGH THE GENERATIONS

When Eleanor Adamson died in April at the age of 93, she left behind a legacy of faith that spilled into the three generations that followed — her children, their children and then their children, her great-grandchildren. Four generations who found more than a Sunday worship practice at Westminster Presbyterian; they found faith, fellowship, friendship and fun through a life-nurturing community of like-minded folks.

Two of Eleanor's daughters, Cathy Adamson, who became her mother's caregiver, and Nancy Leavitt and her husband, Bob, along with their daughter Cory — and Cory's two children Mircalla, 9, and Revan, 5, came together on a recent June evening to talk about just how meaningful the church has been in their lives.

And it's just as clear how the church has benefited from the active participation of this bunch. It all began in 1958 when Eleanor's family moved from Auburn to Lincoln, and she joined the choir at Westminster. Music provided the gateway for all. From middle-school-on choirs for Nancy and Cathy to Nancy's handbell ringing to Bob adding his voice to the choir when he joined the family to their children's singing and occasional instrument playing — Cory with her violin and viola, Cathy's son with his guitar accompanying the organ on a rendition of "Silent Night" — music added a dimension of pleasure and investment in the church. Both Nancy and Cathy have gratitude for the full musical program and the staff that nurtured the talent and interest of those musically inclined members, young and old.

And more. It takes a village to raise a child, said Cathy. "The church was our community."

Nancy and Cathy gave back to the church that gave their families so much. They taught Sunday School — Nancy with the grade-schoolers, Cathy preferring the middle-schoolers. Both have served as elders. Nancy volunteered many years as the director of Camp Calvin Crest, a weeklong summer overnight experience, where Cory went as a camper and then worked as a counselor. Cory credits her first job after college as an English teacher on the Macy Reservation to a Camp Calvin Crest friend who recommended her. The church connections run deep, and this family nurtures them.

"When the Leavitts got involved with the Lohman community as a sister church, they made five mission trips to the former East German town. They have since made two more trips to see their original hosts, who have been here twice to visit after the reunification of Germany. And in 1997 Nancy took a youth group overseas as well. The fact that Nancy can speak German is an added benefit, and to this day church members call on her to translate letters they receive from their Lohman friends.





The church has opened the door for a lot of different opportunities for our family," Cory said. From the Westminster Family Days of earlier times, a two-day retreat at various local colleges, which Cathy describes as a "grown-up camp," to the Wednesday Parents Night Out that offers entertainment and a meal for youngsters while their parents enjoy the reprieve, the church has touched their lives in so many ways. "It's just such as integral part of what we've done," said Nancy.



Although she is technically retired as a social worker at Bryan Hospital, Nancy still fills in on an as-needed basis. The volunteer work she did at the church qualified as her practicum when she received her master's degree in social work.

But she has also honed her leadership skills through the church, which early on sent her to Minnesota for training. She has since served as a moderator for the Presbytery, attended general assemblies in Louisville, Kentucky, and was recognized with the Robert Giles Outstanding Homesteader Award. Cathy remembers accompanying her mother to her regular Sunday seat in the back pew of the balcony for Sunday services until the stairs became too much. But Eleanor's devotion to the church carries on through the generations. Mircalla, who will be a fourth-grader, loves the drama activities, especially playing a church mouse, that she's participated in, and she and Revan, a kindergartner, look forward to musical events as well.

Cory, who has lived in Omaha for 17 years as a high school librarian, is delighted her kids are experiencing the church as she did. She recalled her time as a 20-year-old church elder — the rule has since changed to 21 — and as a youth delegate to the general assembly, all experiences that helped her grow.

As Nancy said, church for this family goes well beyond Sunday mornings. "The church is part of the weave," Nancy began, "the fiber of who we are," Cory finished. And, Cory added, she knows that she can always return and find people she knows. "Church is a safe place. It's comforting to come back to it."

WOMEN OF THE CHURCH:


