# 47th ANNUAL HOLIDAY OF TREES






#### **Please Review Your Third Quarter Giving Statement**

# FAITH THROUGH THE GENERATIONS The White Family

Judy and Jim White are looking forward to 2020 and a family gathering in the summer to mark Judy's 80<sup>th</sup> birthday and 60 years of marriage. (They celebrated Jim's milestone birthday last summer with a family outing to Green Mountain, North Carolina, and it's only fair that Judy gets the same celebratory treatment at a special place not yet chosen.)

Staples at Westminster since they moved to Lincoln in 1990, the Whites let little moss grow under their toes. Both retired in 1998, but the two are far from couch potatoes.

Both hail from western Nebraska, she from Bayard, he from Oshkosh. They met at Chadron State, where Judy got certified to teach school after two years, and Jim stayed on to get a biology degree. He also played offensive guard on the football team, which was undefeated in 1958 in their state college football league division. His teammates still get together for reunions, attended by their coach, who is well into his 90s!

"We have a soft spot in our hearts for Chadron State," confides Judy.

The pair moved to Lexington when Jim graduated, and he took on a full load of science classes as well as expected coaching duties for football, basketball and track. The year was 1961, and he earned \$3,900 for his efforts.

"We were poor as church mice," recalls Judy, who had quit teaching to have the first of their two daughters.

But the 29 years they spent in Lexington brought many new adventures. Judy earned bachelor's and master's degrees in elementary education, and Jim went on to get advanced degrees in counseling and school psychology and became director of special education and school psychology. They were steadfast and active members of the First Presbyterian Church there.

With the move to Lincoln in 1990, Jim joined the team of school psychologists at Lincoln Public Schools, while Judy went on to teach fourth through sixth grades at Beattie Elementary.

With retirement eight years later, they ventured into the antiques business and estate sales, but when the fun went out of it, they moved on. "We proved we could do it and decided it was too much work," says Judy, who has no regrets about the years they spent scouring treasures of the past.

A testament to their taste remains evident in their home, which is filled with exquisite American pottery and Missionstyle furnishings. You'll also find Jim's carpentry skills at work in several pieces of furniture, but especially a magnificent bed. Jim honed his skills building two houses from the ground up when he was in Lexington, and he has mastered the art. And then there's his stained glass studio in the basement and proof of his skill in refashioning a triptych above a living room window to keep the afternoon sun from fading the furniture.

Oh, ask the two about their travels, and they're quick to name Ireland, England Scotland, Germany and Australia among their exploits, plus driving to most of the continental states.

With daughters in Omaha and North Carolina, and four grown grandchildren, including a granddaughter who is a Presbyterian minister in Georgia, the Whites have plenty of reasons to be on the go.

But through it all, Westminster has been a focus and a mainstay. They've been on most every Westminster church committee, and Jim is serving his second term as a Westminster Session Elder. Judy taught Sunday School forever in Lexington. They are especially pleased with the Westminster Bible study classes that bring not only increased faith and learning but the closeness and support of friends.

Jim has served on the disaster response team and has been there from Mississippi to Oklahoma in the wake of hurricanes, tornadoes and flooding, plying his counseling skills as much as his carpentry. But his carpentry skills come in handy as the moderator of the building and grounds committee, charged among other things with keeping an eye on the church's 14 different roofs. Again, he puts to work a carry-over skill from the past: "When you're a counselor and a psychologist, it's all about problem-solving."

As for Judy, she says the church has just been a big part of their lives. "If we skip church, we don't feel like we've gotten the week started right."
