Our focus on gratitude since returning to in-person worship at Westminster has been intentional. For one, gratitude or thanksgiving is found throughout scripture, and scripture should always be a guide for our lives as Christians.

A few favorites from the New Revised Standard Version...

Exodus 15:1 (The Song of Miriam, sung after the Israelites have crossed the Red Sea): "I will sing to the Lord, for he has triumphed gloriously;"

Psalm 9:1 "I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds."

Psalm 106:1 "Praise the Lord! O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures forever."

Matthew 15:36 (Feeding of the 5,000): "Jesus took the seven loaves and the fish; and after giving thanks he broke them and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds."

Luke 22:19 (The Last Supper): "Then Jesus took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Each of these scriptures remind us of our response of thanksgiving for God's grace. This November at Westminster, we have much for which to give God thanks on Sundays and beyond!

On November 7th, Commitment Sunday, we finish up our "Giving in Gratitude" Stewardship season as we give thanks through the act of making a pledge of our tithes and offerings for 2022. On November 21st, we will elect our new Elders and Deacons for 2022. We give thanks for those who have been called to leadership and to care for our people. On November 28th, we celebrate the beginning of the season of Advent. We are thankful for the hope to come for our lives in the Christ-child.

I get it, it seems a little strange talking about Advent at the start of November, but I want us to be prepared. In fact, Advent is the Church Liturgical Season that is all about preparation for the birth of Christ at Christmas.

This Advent, we will focus on gratitude for the opportunity to gather in-person and virtually this year. Our worship will be centered on familiar practices like Advent Wreath lighting by members of our church family, scriptures from the lectionary (3-year cycle of scriptures), and a tangible challenge to live this Advent as a time set apart from the busy-ness of our world's Christmas season (see note at bottom).

As we shift toward Christian season of Advent this November, my prayer is that we might respond to God's grace in Jesus with gratitude in all that we do - from Commitment Sunday to our Advent Workshop! Let us worship, fellowship, learn, and serve with thanksgiving and gratitude in the month ahead!

YOUR SESSION IN ACTION | September Meeting 2021

- Approved request of funds from the WPC Foundation to repair two leaking stained glass windows in the Sanctuary.
- Our financial situation is healthy overall. Committees are preparing budget requests for 2022. The stewardship campaign is in October.
- Approved a sanctuary request for Nebraska Trombone Ensemble (UNL group) for an undetermined Spring Saturday at 4 pm with a reception to follow.
- Guest speaker, Rev. Brian Ellison, Executive Director of the Covenant Network of Presbyterians, spoke and interacted with the Session on the topic of "What it means to *welcome well* as a congregation, and how we might live into our mission statement's call to be 'an inclusive faith family.'" The Network is an association of PC(USA) congregations.
 - Westminster joined the Network in 1997, the year of its founding.
 - Initially the Network was focused on advocacy for the evolution of PC(USA) policies to be more inclusive and affirming, including LGBTQ+ ordination and same-sex marriage. Today the Network focuses on education for and support of congregations in their work to be more inclusive.
 - Brian challenged us to think about how welcoming we are. He shared that welcome is about community and that inequity of access to community systemic exclusion—is a scandal to the Gospel. We should not be complicit to such exclusion.
 - He called us to:
 - Reaffirm our call to the Covenant
 - Think about ACTION.
- The Session's answers—signs of inclusions/steps we could take to make WPC more welcoming to ALL individuals
 - Welcome congregational conversation and education about inclusion and welcome.
 - Be open to more diverse community groups and welcome them into our spaces.
 - Update our website and communication to be clearer about our vision for inclusion.
 - Engage committees on inclusion and accessibility (for example Buildings and Grounds considering questions of ADA compliance).
 - o Become a focus of the Mission and Outreach Committee

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The Season of Gratitude

In an era where everyone has a smartphone and instant gratification is never more than a click-away, it can be difficult to practice intentional gratitude. From shopping online to scrolling through social media or even dating through an app, our overstimulation can distract us from being thankful for the blessings in our lives.

But as we all know from Pastor Chris, the Presbyterian response to grace is gratitude. And by expressing our thanks for the good things in our lives we are better able to celebrate the present, dispel negative emotions, promote inner resilience, and build a higher sense of self-worth.

That is why it is so important to not only practice intentional gratitude ourselves. but also to cultivate an attitude of thankfulness in our children. Just like us, our children have so many different distractions that constantly vie for their attention. And at times, it may even seem like teaching our children to slowdown and be thankful for what they've been given would be like trying to teach a goldfish how to play the clarinet. But in spite of these challenges, studies consistently show that expressing thanks is one of the easiest ways to increase one's happiness. In fact, gratitude is so crucial that it is widely believed to be one of the most healthy human emotions.

With that in mind, helping our families to be thankful is not simply a matter of politeness, but an essential life skill with serious implications for our emotional and spiritual wellbeing.

So then just how do we begin to be more thankful?

Notice – Start by becoming aware of a person, place, or thing you want to appreciate.

Think – Start thinking about why you've been given these things. What are all the reasons why you are thankful for this person or thing?

Feel – When you think about these special things or people how do you feel?

Do – What can you do to express your gratitude for this person, place, or thing?

That last part is probably the most tricky, so let's talk for a moment about what we can 'do' to show gratitude. Here are some ideas for things we can do with our families that show gratitude while modelling an attitude of thankfulness for our children.

Gratitude Ideas for Kids (and Grown-ups too)

- Find a favorite Bible verse that expresses your gratitude to God
- 2. Invest in window paint and have your kids write what they are thankful for on a window in your house
- 3. Model gratitude
- 4. Take turns at dinner sharing one awesome thing from your day
- 5. At bedtime, say three things you appreciate about each other
- 6. In the car, play a game where you say all the things you love (color, food, movie, hobby, school class, sport, song, etc.)
- 7. Every Sunday share one nice thing you will do for someone this week
- 8. Start a gratitude journal as a family
- 9. Make a habit of writing thank you notes
- 10. Go on a gratitude scavenger hunt.
- 11. Volunteer to help someone in need

Whatever you choose to do during this season of giving thanks, do it regularly and consistently. As the days pass, new thinking patterns will begin to develop and you will find it easier to change your attitude towards one of thanks. So whether you are trying to help your children learn an attitude of thankfulness or if you are working on cultivating one for yourself, make this the beginning of a whole year of intentional gratitude.

"I'll take you as my people, and I'll be your God." Exodus 6:7

Last month, we learned part of the story of Moses. In November, we leave Egypt and move into the wilderness with the Israelites. Here, we will pause to consider the Ten Commandments, "rules" God gave to Moses.

The longest psalm in the Bible, Psalm 119, is a song of praise about God's laws. In general, rules are a good thing. They provide structure for our lives and a framework for how to live well. God's laws help us know how to love and serve God, and how to live in relationship with one another.

The first, and probably most famous, set of God's laws is the Ten Commandments. Even though it's been over three thousand years since God gave the Ten Commandments to the Israelites, these basic laws about relating to God and to other people are still applicable to our lives today.

But the Ten Commandments are more than a list of dos and don'ts. These laws are about relationships, the relationship between God and us as God's chosen people, and our relationships with one another. Primarily, these commandments spell out how we are chosen as God's people and are to be loyal to God alone, and how we need to treat others with love and respect. These commandments provide a framework for living together as God's people.

HOMESTEAD PRESBYTERY MEETING

- · Pastor Sue Collier, First Presbyterian Church Lincoln, is the Moderator of Homestead Presbytery this year. She presided over this quarterly meeting.
- The featured speaker was Elona Street-Stewart, Co-Moderator of the 224th General Assembly (our national organization) and Synod Executive of the Synod of Lakes and Prairies (our Synod). Elona's theme was HOPE. We need hope. We give up when we lose hope. She spoke to the present reality and our need to choose realistic goals.
- Elona assured us the church at large is alive and doing well. It is embracing the concepts of Mathew 25 (look it up!), embracing dismantling structural racism, eradicating poverty and stopping hunger. Making change needs active involvement. The church is bringing real hope. The church is doing good.
- Our synod has identified funds to set up two trusts: one for indigenous people and the other for African Americans. These funds will be run by representatives of the beneficiary group and will fund non-profits and individuals. We will be able to donate to these funds. We will have other initiatives working toward restorative steps. We need to set aside Supremacy, the Wealth Gap, and Privilege.
- · Stephen Earls's contract as Interim Executive Presbyter of Homestead was extended until December 2022.
- · A new pastor, Erika Nelson, was voted into Presbytery as Pastor of Heritage Presbyterian Church Lincoln.



Youth Group
