Westminster Family,

January not only a new year and the kick-off of our "Why Westminster" vision, but it is also the time we kick-off our 2022 Confirmation Class! At the time of the Messenger Deadline, we have twelve youth committed and begin classes on Sunday, January 9th. This month I want to share a little with our whole church family about Confirmation from my perspective as one of the handson leaders.

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Personally, I have either led or been a key part in planning Confirmation classes for more than 18 years. Through those classes, many trial-and-error adaptations, and a wonderful seminary class on Confirmation Journeys with Dr. Rodger Nishioka - a leading expert on Christian Education in the PC(USA) - I have developed the view that Confirmation is a process 'not just' for youth, but for the work of the whole church and our individual families. Core components are group sessions on Sundays, a church-member Mentor relationship, and weekly "@home" discussions with an adult parent/guardian.

What is Confirmation?

Confirmation is a short-term journey of Christian learning, living, and commitment. The Confirmation journey's goal is growth in a young person's relationship with Jesus Christ and the church and their basic understanding of core Biblical, theological and Reformed concepts. As in all areas of our education at Westminster, tying knowledge to our practice as Christians day-to-day is a crucial part of our process and the denominational curriculum we use.

Confirmation gives our youth a chance to intentionally explore, articulate, and live out what they believe as followers of Jesus. It is not the beginning nor the end of an individual's faith journey, but instead, an intentionally formational part of the life of faith in our tradition. This process culminates with the writing of a faith statement and the opportunity to make a commitment by professing one's faith and joining the church on Confirmation Sunday. Again, the big-picture goal is formation that leads to bearing fruit in daily life.

It is possible we will still need mentors for our youth at the time of the Messenger's publication, so please reach out to me (chris@westminsterlincoln.org) if you are interested or have questions about that part of the process. Otherwise, I encourage you all to pray for our youth, the volunteer teacher team, and the families engaged in this journey together this Winter/Spring.

Looking ahead to 2022, it's good to remember that "Why Westminster?" is the framing question for our congregational vision. In the days and years ahead the nurture of our youth and children will be a priority in the vision and ministry of Westminster, and Confirmation is one of many wonderful ways we express that priority!

Faith to Forest—Train as a Volunteer

The Lincoln Parks Department is responsible for over 1500 new trees each year—and each tree needs to be pruned three times during its first 15 years of life! In this new program Prairie Pruners volunteers will learn how to provide the necessary care for newly planted trees and then put that knowledge to use in Lincoln's parks.

Training will consist of a Zoom presentation followed by an in-person field session. The Parks Department will designate workdays and areas, and will provide tools and haul the debris. All pruning will be done without the use of ladders, using small tools like hand clippers and small hand saws. Trees also benefit from mulching, another volunteer opportunity that requires less training and can be done as a one-time service project.

Volunteer Spotlight: Laurie Lofquist

From ushers and greeters to children and youth leaders and everyone else in-between, Westminster volunteers use their gifts to serve others on a daily basis. These committed individuals make everything we do here at Westminster possible, and this month our spotlight is on another generous and talented individual, Laurie Lofquist.

For Laurie, rejoining Westminster was coming home to the church of her childhood. After graduating from college, she spent a number of years teaching psychology at Millard South in Omaha and several more years in Hastings. In 2019, Laurie, her husband, Kraig, and their two daughters, Lexi, 12, and Brooke, 10, moved to Lincoln, where she now teaches at Schoo Middle School as well as serving as a professor in the Doane College of Education Graduate program. The Lofquist family also includes Haley, Laurie's 29-year-old stepdaughter, and their dog, Oliver, a senior lab/Saint Bernard mix, who the family considers to be a 100% lovedog.

Volunteering has long been an important part of Laurie's life. While teaching at Millard South, she was asked by the local Lions club to sponsor the development of a service organization at the high school. Through that experience, she was able to see how powerfully her service impacted the teens in her program. Laurie observes "There is a certain energy that can happen when you serve."

After moving to Omaha, she continued volunteering, serving at church and at school on the PTO. In Hastings, she was active in the children and youth program at the First Presbyterian Church, cooking and teaching on Wednesdays as well as helping out with VBS. While it was an exhausting experience, it was also highly rewarding and allowed her to get to know the church members and their children. Laurie is currently serving at Westminster on Session, as Chair of the Children and Youth Committee, and volunteers to help teach on Wednesday.



Laurie recognizes that "Those who serve in a volunteer role are invaluable to organizations." But volunteering serves a more personal purpose as well. While her individual spiritual journey has, at times, brought doubt, she always finds herself returning to the realization that there is something larger than our own selfish existence. "I want my kids to grow up in a church which helps them think of others and the larger picture, while also being a place where they can express doubt and grow in their faith." For her, the Presbyterian church provides exactly that type of environment.

Being a volunteer often means having to be flexible and deal with unforeseen circumstances. Those are the times, however, that can wind up being the most meaningful. Laurie shared how she felt great disappointment that the first "Trunk-or-Treat" after the pandemic lockdown was rained out and had to be moved inside. "As I stood at the door and greeted people whole were walking into Westminster for the first time, I felt an important role of being welcoming. I would like us to be a place where strangers can come and feel welcome, and I felt this to be true that evening."

As for what she has learned about herself through volunteering, Laurie acknowledges that she prefers to show up and do the work rather than serve as the organizer – meetings are really not her thing. She also has found that volunteering leads to the development of great relationships with other volunteers. Also, she says to keep in mind that volunteering does not need to be a long-term commitment. It can be as simple as showing up when asked and helping out with a single event. "I served on PTO and there would be parents that never attended meetings but I could count on them to show up and do the work when asked. Organizers of events very much appreciate any service people can offer!"

"Take a chance," Laurie encourages, "and find something you think you might enjoy. In the process, you will find roles that fit you and those that do not. Service to others may be altruistic, but it also is incredibly fulfilling."

"JUST IN CASE"

"When you reap the harvest of your land, you are not to reap to the very edge of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Do not strip your vineyard bare or gather its fallen grapes. Leave them for the poor and the resident alien; I am the Lord your God." Leviticus 19:9-10

Now that Christmas has come and gone, and we have quietly moved into a new space full of hope and promise, it is time to think about how this new year will unfold. Many of us will begin to write lists that include resolutions about how we will change in the next 365 days. This is the year I will...begin going to the gym, quit smoking, lose weight, pay off credit cards, spend less time working, go back to school, study harder, practice an instrument more... anything that will make us different than we were last year.

And yet each list of new year's resolutions piles more and more on top of schedules that are already packed full; it seems that we tend to operate with very little margin. We are constantly spread way too thin with our money, our time, and our emotions. Or, to borrow a phrase from the Bible, we tend to "plow to the edge of our fields."

In the book of Leviticus, we see that God instructed his people to leave some margin on the edge, not just so that His people would have healthy habits, but also for the sake of others who might wander into their fields. Some days the people might not come; other days they would. Regardless, the edges of the field were for "just in case" someone needed food for themselves or their family.

What if, instead of pushing to all the way to every proverbial edge, we adopted a "just in case" mentality? What if we left some time in our schedule "just in case" we had the

opportunity to listen to someone in need of attention? What if we left a little unspent money "just in case" we had the chance to provide for a family who was having a tough year financially? What if we intentionally didn't go all the way to the edge because, in faith, we believed that God would bring someone's need our way?

Good things can happen when we live with a sense of "just in case." During some dark days of Israel, there was still a man who took seriously the law of God and didn't plow to the edges. And because he didn't, a young widow named Ruth was able to glean the wheat from the edges in order to provide food for her and her mother-in-law, Naomi. Boaz, the owner of that field, ended up marrying the gleaner Ruth.

Amazing things can happen when you don't plow to the edges of your life.

So this year, instead of making a list of all the ways you need to do more and be better, try not plowing to the edges of your life; try making room for "just in case."
