A Message to the Congregation

Westminster,

I think there's a pretty simple truth we can all agree upon: we give because we are grateful. We give our time packing boxes in the Westminster Food Pantry. We give our input in listening sessions with Ministry Architects. We give our money to support the wideranging work of Westminster as a church family. This year our Giving Season's focus is simply, "Grateful!" a word and a feeling that emphasizes our response to God's grace and goodness – with gratitude!

If you are a member, you will receive a small packet of information about how to give in 2026. If you are not a member, you may request information from the church office or on our website after November 5th. In 2025, our Finance Committee has been clear about the need for increased giving to support and grow our budget. And you have responded! Our staff and leadership are "Grateful!" for your increased support. Now... before you put down your coffee and turn the page keep reading a few points on 'why' and 'how' you can help us have a thriving and flourishing year in 2026 as a church!

Why Pledge to Give for 2026...

- Where we have been: In December 2026 we will celebrate 100 years at Sheridan and South. For the upcoming year we will engage moments and memories from our past in celebration of our history and tradition.
- Where we are now: Our youth program for 6th 12th graders is at its highest engagement and participation level since 2019, and we are engaging children's ministry with a renewed focus as part of our Ministry Architects Consultancy Journey. Between staffing of one full-time Director of Children & Youth and two part-time youth leaders, a significant space in Faith Village and the Youth Café that requires cleaning and heating/cooling

- several times a week, and a robust program budget, 15-20% of every dollar you give in 2026 goes toward Children & Youth Ministries (and that doesn't include our large support of Westminster Preschool)!
- Where we are headed: 2026 will include an intensive look at the usage of our facilities, and as I like to say, will be our year to shift to a more positive view of seeing our buildings and grounds as a vessel for mission and ministry rather than a financial hassle to keep up. To make that shift, we have to not only maintain but also continually improve our facilities. Your giving supports that renewed vision and emphasis on welcoming and supporting our neighbors for the coming years!

How to Give for 2026...

- Bring your completed Pledge Card to worship on November 16th, and place it in the basket during worship. You may also return it to the church office via mail. This act is both symbolic and practical. Pledging before the end of the year allows us to plan well for a faithful, impactful, and growthfocused 2026!
- You are encouraged by our Stewardship Team to consider "The Power of 10" – increasing your giving in some way by 10% this coming year.
- If you gave more in 2025 and can continue or increase that support for future years, we hope you will increase your pledge to help us in a world where costs only go up year-to-year.
- Help us meet our goal of growing Pledged Giving Income to \$650,000. It's a big goal, but if as we heard in a recent sermon on Luke, a little faith can go a long way.

Westminster, let's give because we are grateful toward our faith life together in 2026!

November tips from Presbyterians for Earth Care and Green@Heart:

Climate Friendly Cooking & Eating – tread more gently In the most comprehensive analysis to date of dietary patterns and their climate impact, researchers have found that vegan diets create 75% less greenhouse gas emissions than meat-heavy diets. Eating lower on the food chain, cooking with plants and not animals, will help reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Are we suggesting that you should move to an entirely plant-based diet? No, not at all! But we are encouraging you to move in that direction maybe one, two or three days a week. Even a small commitment will make a difference.


An excerpt from the Montclair Presbyterian Church (Oakland, CA) cookbook says, "Humans have complex relationships with food. Food is deeply connected to our habits, emotions and identities. It also reflects our hospitality. It can be a source of comfort and familiarity, health and well-being, and creativity and

self-expression. We use food to communicate affection and to maintain family and cultural traditions. Enjoying food with those we love is one of life's greatest pleasures. Yet, sadly, our current ways of feeding ourselves are not sustainable. Global food production accounts for at least 26% of the world's greenhouse gas emissions, and animal agriculture – livestock, fish farms, and the feed and land they require – accounts for over half of those emissions."Do you want to try and eat lower on the food chain? Look at the chart below and imagine what that might look like for you and your family.Look for plant-based cookbooks.Cook with a friend or family member.Get creative with your cooking and you could just help save the planet.

To help you get started, look for plant based recipes in the Vine and EVine during the month of November from Green@Heart and kitchens near you.

Finance Committee Update

The Stewardship & Finance Committee would like to provide an update on the status of the church's financials for 2025.

Earlier this year, the Session approved, and the congregation was presented, the 2025 budget and there were some significant concerns. The budget presented was an honest and transparent budget that showed a budget shortfall of approximately \$113,000. At that meeting, we asked for your patience, understanding and help. We are pleased to provide you with an update that is good news. Our committee has worked very hard at leaving no stone unturned as we promised we would do. Expenses have been managed by all the committees within the church well and we anticipate the expenses will come in under budget for the year. The foundation has provided support to the church quarterly as was planned. In addition, the foundation has assisted with some of the administrative expenses relating to their operations previously covered by the church. A new contract with the preschool is nearly complete. All of the asset and liability accounts on the church's financial statements have been researched and some

reallocation has resulted in additional income for the year. But now for the good news that was outside of our control. We notified you, members of the congregation, of our concerns with the finances, and you have responded. Pledges for the year have come in at a higher rate through the first 3 quarters of the year than in the past. In addition, slightly over \$45,000 of additional unanticipated giving beyond pledges has been received to assist with the budget shortfall. We cannot thank you enough for your support. We haven't fully resolved the shortfall, but we have reduced the budget shortfall from it's initial starting point of \$113,000. We are currently projecting a shortfall of approximately \$15,000. This is definitely something to celebrate. We ask for your continued support as we strive to finish the year strong. As you may recall, the budget presented did not include any raises for our staff; a fact that none of us are proud of. We are hopeful that if the 4th quarter continues as the first three have, we will be able to rectify that issue as well as provide some assistance to committees for things that had to be left out of the budget for the year.
